INTRODUCES NEW LINE OF BAND INSTRUMENTS

Introduced in various pieces of advertising literature by the courtly gentleman shown here, Cavalier, "America's lowest priced line of band instru-



ments," has recently made its appearance on the market. The new line is a product of the Pan-American Band Instrument & Case Co., Elkhart, Ind., and represents a new standard of quality in the low-price band instrument field.

At present, seven instruments, ranging in

price from \$32.50 for the cornet to \$97.50 for the tenor saxophone, comprise the Cavalier line. According to F. W. Neptune, sales manager of the company, however, plans for the future include the manufacture of a complete line of band instruments.

A newly developed one-piece, trouble-proof valve, in which all intricate mechanism has been eliminated, is a feature of the line. Other quality features, unusual in low-price band instruments, are silver-plated saxophone keys and one-piece, nickel silver inside slides on trombones. All Cavalier instruments are furnished in silver plated, sand blast finish with bright gold bells
