

Elton Musical Products

New York, NY

- 1918 Leigh Arthur Elkington (1884-1967) is a factory rep for Arthur Boomhomer Corp, #212 5th Ave, NY (draft)
- 1920 Elkington is listed as the owner of a metal goods business and living at #502 W. 170th St, NY (census)
- 1922 Elton banjo resonators are sold by C. Bruno & Son (*MTR*)
- 1923 Elton combination mutes for cornet or trombone are sold by B&J of NY; they are made from aluminum and are designed for plain or jazz tones (*MTR*)
- 1924 Elton Wow-Wow mutes are sold by Bruno & Son (*MTR*)
- 1925 B&J is selling Elton Wow-Wow & combination mutes (*MTR*)
- 1927 L. A. Elkington is president of Elkington Co., #220 E. 34th St, NY; manufacturer of Elton musical specialties (*MTR*)
- 1928 Elkington buys the Eventone Mfg Co., Brooklyn (*MTR*)
- 1936 Elkington living at #323 E. 34th (immigration)
- 1942 Elkington is self-employed at #323 E. 34th (draft)
- 1946 L. A. Elkington, metal specialties, #323 E. 34th St, NY (telephone book)
- 1963 Elton Musical Products, #2664 Park Ave, NY (catalog)
- 1967 Elkington dies in July in the Bronx (social security)
- 1968 Elton Musical Products is signed up for a music convention (*Billboard*) [perhaps before he died; he married late and is not listed with children so I don't know if the company existed past his death]
