Marked on original warranty paper that it was purchased on July 18, 1968 for \$22. This would imply that it was either used at the time or old stock on clearance.

Foremost: This was a Pennys brand made by Murray Ohio and sold under various names such as the Murray Meteor Flite (photo 2) and Sears Flightliner beginning in the Spring of 1958 (photo 1). There was also the Murray Comet (photo 3).

Murray History: The Murray Ohio Manufacturing Co. was founded in 1919 in Cleveland to make automobile parts. They branched out into bicycles in the 1930s and post-WWII offered lower cost models. Many were designed by Viktor Schreckengost (1906-2008) (photo 4), a prolific industrial designer.

In 1956, the company moved manufacturing to 100 Hicks St in Lawrenceburg, Tennessee with the corporate office in Brentwood. In the 1980s, they changed to cheaper models sold through department stores to try and keep business going despite less expensive imported competition.









In 1988, they were sold to British group Tomkins PLC, but by the late 1990s, all bicycle manufacturing ended due to Chinese imports.

Pennys: In the Fall of 1963, the Pennys catalog offered the "New" Foremost model bicycle (photo 1 & below). This matches the Murray Meteor Flite model from 1962 (photo 2). The deluxe model in photo 1 had a vertical piece between the front dual headlights with the Foremost name.



Fall 1966 Pennys catalog (photo 2) shows the bike missing the vertical name.

December 1966 Pennys catalog (photo 3). This is the first appearance of what looks like a white seat and matches exactly with mine.



December 1967 Pennys catalog (photo 4) shows a new design for the more expensive model that first appeared in 1966.

I could not find a 1968 catalog, but by the Fall of 1969 (below), the rack and lights are gone. They have also dropped the Foremost brand name. In 1970, the curved frame was gone and replaced by a traditional triangle.











Dating my Foremost:

Since only the December 1966 catalog shows a white seat, I am assuming that this one dates to between late 1966 and late 1967. This also matches the "Foremost Economy Middleweight" model selling for \$38.88 in the Christmas 1966 catalog. It would have been made in the huge factory in Lawrenceburg (photo 1).

Another dating clue is that Murray moved the location of their serial number to the left rear drop in 1965, which this example has (photo 2, #999434). The 40x24 mark is for the front to rear gear ratio.

This came with the original paperwork including instructions for the lights marked "Revised 4/26/62", so it was certainly made after this date. The guarantee paper is marked, "Bike Purchased 7/18/68 for \$22." My guess at this point is that it was made in 1967 and not sold until 1968. Perhaps the low price compared to the catalog was for a clearance sale.



Even the tires & tubes are original on this and are marked with "Pennys" and "Foremost" (photo 5). The rims are stamped "M O Mfg Co" for Murray (photo 6).

The rear wheel has a Komet Super Coaster Brake 161 which was made in Germany by Fichtel & Sachs.
